

Traditional Cod Fishing Grounds of the Community of Change Islands, Newfoundland and Labrador

Topographic data (CanVec 1:50,000) was obtained from Natural Resources Canada and bathymetric data was provided by the Canadian Hydrographic Service.



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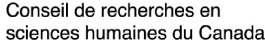
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Note: Fishing spots shown here are mainly traditional cod fishing locations, including many that continue to be used today. This map does not include the historically significant fishing area surrounding the Little Egg Islands to the northeast, where Change Islanders maintained seasonal residences until the early 1900s. Presumably lobster, shellfish, snapper, crab and other fishing locations are not included either. Fishing spots shown here are based on information provided by six key informants in 2009 and represent only a fraction of traditional named fishing spots. Alternate names are also likely common. Many locations were confirmed with GPS coordinates, but most are approximate, plotted during "kitchen table mapping" sessions. Over 95 percent of placenames on this map were derived from local geographic knowledge, 2008-2009. Numerous navigational hazards are not indicated and as such, this map should not be used for navigational purposes.

This map shows the South Shetland Islands in Antarctica. Key features include:

- Islands and Reefs:** Balcalhao Island, Herring Head, Jack's Island, Moorham Reef (Old Melville), and various smaller reefs and rocks like Sly Rock, Creepers Ledge, and Hammer Ledge.
- Water Bodies:** The map shows the surrounding waters, including the area labeled "MIDDLE GROUND".
- Geographical Features:** Features like "Cobb's Arm" and "Green Gulch" are labeled.
